Direction and Project Management of the Oregon Multicultural Archives (OMA), 2010-Present and OSU Queer Archives (OSQA), 2014-Present

I develop OMA and OSQA collections and projects with various stakeholder groups across the library, OSU campus, and various cultural, ethnic, and LGBTQ+ organizations and community members across the state. I lead outreach activities, curate physical and online exhibits, coordinate the arrangement and description of collections, develop digital collections, and supervise students, interns, and volunteers.

Selected Projects:

- OSU Building and Place Names Evaluation and Renaming Process, 2016-2018 ~ I worked closely with the Office of Institutional Diversity and participated in the development of evaluation criteria, led the historical research assistance process, and co-designed and implemented the community engagement plan.
- *Latinos en Oregón* Oral History Project, 2015-Present ~ I use a community-based collaborative approach in which I train community liaisons to lead the project locally, now in four counties. I have collaborated with the OSU Juntos Program, *Unidos* Bridging Community of Yamhill County, and the Hood River County Museum.
- OSU Queer Archives (OSQA), 2014-present ~ I co-founded OSQA based on the community's needs. Since its establishment, I have engaged students in scholarly and creative activities, acquired various collections, and have organized several community activities.
- Oregon Chinese Disinterment Documents Collection online exhibit, 2011-2012 ~ I designed and created an online exhibit to showcase a collection of 1948-1949 disinterment documents and wrote the historical information to contextualize the materials. This project was in collaboration with Northwest News Network, the Chinese Consolidated Benevolent Association, Portland, OR, and the Portland State University Special Collections and University Archives.
- The Oregon Tribal Archives Institute (OTAI), 2011-2012 ~ I managed the team that organized the OTAI with the goal to provide Oregon's tribal archivists and records managers with professional development and networking opportunities through a week-long training.

Instruction for the Oregon Multicultural Archives & OSU Queer Archives

I teach students archival and information literacy research skills that enable them to effectively locate, evaluate, use, and create primary resources within various disciplines. My focus as an instructor is to actively engage students in the scholarly process and share their research with their peers and the wider OSU community; an approach which reflects high impact practices. To ensure impact, I collaborate with faculty to develop course-specific curricula and create online learning tools such as course pages and subject guides highlighting selected resources.

Selected Classes (since 2014):

- HST 368: Lesbian and Gay Movements in Modern America, Spring 2016-2017 and Winter 2019-2020 ~ In collaboration with my OSQA co-founder, we worked with a history professor's students to train them in conducting oral history interviews to add to the Oregon State Queer Archives Oral History Collection.
- UEXP 290: Information and Global Social Justice: Italy, Study Abroad, Summer 2017 ~ I co-led a three-week study abroad course to Ferrara, Italy with six students. The course focused on discussions, comparisons, activities and tours, and research regarding social justice issues in both Italy and the United States.
- ALS 199 U-Engage: Untold Stories: Histories of People of Color in Oregon, Fall 2015, and ES 553: Ethnohistory Methodology, 2014-2019 ~ I have collaborated with faculty to develop assignments for students, at both the freshman and graduate level, to create guidebooks available to the public that feature the histories of people of color in the Oregon State University and Corvallis communities. I teach the students archival research strategies and assist them in the creation of the guidebooks; the classes culminate with public tours. The ALS class created the "Untold Stories: Histories of Students of Color at OSU" campus tour guidebook and the ES 553 classes have created four "Corvallis Social Justice Tour" guidebooks.

 The DSP aims to create a more diverse and inclusive Library Sciences field by providing

 evaluation of employees. I implemented these processes for the program's three Diversity
 Scholars, two of which have successfully completed their appointments.
